Workshop/Lecture Title	Presenter(s)	Description
Introduction to Effective Aid	Workshop -Engineers Without Borders (McMaster Chapter)	This is an interactive workshop to get participants thinking about various types of aid and their effectiveness. The focus will be on development aid applied at a community level. Participants will work in groups acting as NGOs. They will face a hypothetical impoverished community and work together to form a development aid plan.
Part II – MSF’s Top 10 Humanitarian Disasters of 2009	Workshop - Friends of Médecins Sans Frontières / Doctors Without Borders.	Each year Médecins Sans Frontières / Doctors Without Borders release a list of the world’s Top Ten Humanitarian Crises. The recently released crises for 2009, as determined by the firsthand accounts of MSF’s relief workers, has been drawn from this NGO’s involvement in close to 70 countries. This workshop aims to uncover under some of the worst humanitarian conditions in our global society, many of which are highly underreported in the media. In bringing about greater awareness of these often underreported issues, delegates will engage in honest discourse about the issues affecting of our global society.
The New Faces of Grandmothers: HIV/AIDS	Workshop - The Grandmothers of Steel: Stephen Lewis Foundation	The HIV/AIDS pandemic in Africa has had profound consequences on the entire fabric of society. Stepping up to the challenges of raising the orphaned children, caring for the sick and keeping the communities together, are the African grandmothers. These resilient, resourceful and determined women have inspired a movement in Canada of grandmothers who take their direction from the African grandmothers and act to support them by raising awareness, generating funds and advocating on their behalf. This workshop will look at some of these African women, and the grassroots projects which empower them.
Reparations to Africa	Lecture by Dr. Rhoda Hayward-Hassmann, Canada Research Chair in International Human Rights	Rhoda E. Howard-Hassmann is Canada Research Chair in International Human Rights at Wilfrid Laurier University, where she holds a joint appointment in the Department of Global Studies and the Balsillie School of International Affairs. She is also a Senior Research Fellow at the Centre for International Governance Innovation, and a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada. In 2006 the Human Rights section of the American Political

		<p>Science Association named Dr. Howard-Hassmann its first Distinguished Scholar of Human Rights. Among many other published works on human rights, she is co-editor of the 2007 volume, <i>The Age of Apology</i> and author of <i>Reparations to Africa</i> (2008) and <i>Can Globalization Promote Human Rights?</i> (forthcoming, 2010). Her current research interests are in human security and state-induced famine. Volunteering 2.0: On-line Volunteering in Action	Workshop - TakingItGlobal	<p>How has technology transformed the idea of volunteering and what are the positive and negative results? In correlation to this, what are the new ethics of online volunteering, and how have economic and social factors been impacted? Everyday activities are being revolutionized in an age of technological and digital advances. The methods and duties of volunteering have not been spared by this digital age, and have therefore transformed into a popular and viable enterprise for many. In this workshop, delegates will explore what it means to be an online volunteer, the different tools and accessibility options available, and the positive and negative ramifications of digital volunteering.</p>
Rising Floodwaters	Workshop -Alvin Keng (BHsc III, Global Health Specialization)	<p>Though short-lived, natural disasters are a prominent public health issue due to their high impact nature. One example of this turbulence can be found in the Philippines; a hot-bed for earthquakes, volcanic eruptions, typhoons, and floods. During the 2009 typhoon season, densely populated Metro Manila was the victim of Typhoon Ondoy (Ketsana). McMaster student, Alvin Keng will discuss his experience immersed in this environment while working with the NGO Gawad Kalinga. The purpose of this session is threefold: to provide an account of one relief worker's experience during Typhoon Ondoy, analyze the relationship between natural disasters and public health, and discuss how the global community can respond to future localized disasters.</p>

For each issue, we will present a summary of the</p>
